A Funny Thing Happened On the Way to Distinguished

Last year Founder's District barely missed being a Distinguished District. It achieved three out of four goals, but failed in the category of Total Membership. At the risk of sounding like I am making excuses, who would have thought that in replacing eight weak, low-member clubs, with 15 new, charter-strength clubs-and adding more than 1,200 new members—the District would fall short in its membership goals?

But that is what happened. How can that be?

The problem lies in member retention. A review of the stats shows club after club, with, for example, a base of 20 members, 17 renewals in October, and 14 renewals in April.

In my view, the flaw is in the Critical Success Factors and the Distinguished Club Program. There is no direct incentive for retaining members. Theo-

retically, it is possible for a club to fail to retain a single member but gain 20 new members and still be Distinguished.

The new member part is great; but the loss of current members is a real shame.

It is submitted that the retention of current members is every bit as important as acquiring new members: "A member saved, is a member earned."

In fact, a current, active member is more valuable than a new member, who may never attend a meeting or who may drop out after only a few meetings. An added benefit is that focusing on creating an environment conducive to retaining members will also aid in attracting new members.

Accordingly, this year, Founder's District will put a new emphasis on Member Retention. We will do that through education and training.

To paraphrase a great movie, "If we build it, they will come; and they will stay."

If we show them, through excellence in programming, that Toastmasters is the best possible use for their hour or

hour and a half, how can they afford not to come

We realize that this puts a great deal of pressure on the Club Vice President of Education, as well as, the Lt. Governor of Education and Training. So be it, we live for pressure.

It is the job of the Lt. Governor of Marketing, and the Club Vice President of Membership to bring the new members in; it is our job to keep them coming back.

VP Membership Fall/Winter Contest

Founder's District is looking for the top Vice President of Membership in each Division for the first half of the year (July 1—December 31, 2004). The winners will be announced at the first District Elected Leaders and PRO meeting on February 17.

The VP of Membership with the most points for each Division will receive a plaque in recognition of their achievement at the Division Contest. That person will also receive a Founder's VP of Membership Award at the District Conference with free Conference Registration.

The winner must complete at least 11 of the 19 items listed below. (One point will be awarded for each item unless noted differently.)

- 1. Attend District/Division VP Membership Officer Training by August 30, 2004.
- 2. Promote Toastmasters International and Founder's District's Membership Building Contests ("Smedley Campaign)." (1 point for every member who signed as a result of campaign)
- 3. Conduct one formal Club Membership Building Campaign. This may be done in conjunction with the Tl's established Membership campaign in No. 2.
- 4. Coordinate and hold a Club Speechcraft. Post dates on the Founder's District web site. (Send to Bob Hudack at rjhudack@uciedu,). 5 points
- 5. Conduct a Membership Interest Survey (catalog No. 403) and a Club Evaluation Climate Questionnaire (catalog No. 251-C). Report the findings and implement club changes based on the survey results. (1 point each)
 - 6. Club completes Goal 7 in the DCP (Four new members).
 - 7. Club completes Goal 8 in the DCP (Four more new members).
- 8. Present the Successful Club Series "Finding New Members for Your Club," (catalog No. 291-A)
- 9. Present the Successful Club Series "Closing The Sale." (catalog No. 293-A)
- Create a "Guest Package" or "Orientation Packet" Submit a listing of what is included.
 - 11. Bring five different Guests to the Club Meetings.
- 12. Follow-up on all Club Guests with a phone call, e-mail or US mailing. (Document the guest's name, date of the visit and date of the follow-up.)
- 13. Conduct the process of Voting Members into the Club. (Names of new members, when they were voted in.)
- 14. Help ensure that the Club President installs the new members. (Names of new members, when they were installed.)
- 15. Arrange the presentation of "Moments of Truth" module in the club and send results. 5 points
- 16. Attend at least two Area Council meetings or at least one Division Council meeting. (1 point per Council meeting).
- 17. Establish and submit a member retention process update within the club. 5 points (first time)
- 18. Assist with the Semi-Annual Report and assure that it is in the U.S. mail prior to October 10.
- 19. Maintain membership retention of 80% or better (when submitting the above Semi-Annual Report).
- 20. Ensure that an Officer List is sent to TI and the District Governor via the Founder's District web site (by December 31st).

bers earn CTMs? Professional musicians practice scales daily. Professional athletes practice routine drills to stay in shape. Getting back to the basics by achieving another CTM will enhance your already developed speaking skills and take you to a higher level. Officers can earn a Competent Leader every year after completing another CTM.

To enhance incentives for new members to complete their speeches, the District offers up to five CTM ribbons per Club for members to wear at speech contests, conferences, and District meetings. After the CTM is completed, the Club could present a CTM ribbon announcing a well-earned achievement to be worn proudly.

More than 100 Clubs in Founder's District submitted DCP plans by DEC, August 12. They earned a Gold ribbon for their banner.

Let's have 100% participation and have the other 100 Clubs turn in their plans by September 30 to earn a silver ribbon.

The Area Governors are working hard to help their Clubs make it happen. 


