The current members of Founder's District Toastmasters remain at the forefront. If you're not achieving your goals in Toastmasters, you have several options.

Discuss your goals with your club's Vice President of Education and set a new speaking schedule for yourself - maybe one speech a month. You can also be a guest speaker at another club to reach your speaking goals. Initiate a conversation with your mentor. Don't have one? Ask your VP of Education to assign one.

Some experienced members are ready to make the transition from speaker to leader, or quite possibly to mentor. Sharing your knowledge as a seasoned presenter is the next natural and rewarding step.

Your needs and goals are the foundation of the District. Based upon this premise, I ask you to complete one of two tasks: If you're struggling to reach your goals, ask for help - OR - If you're achieving your goals, share your success. Your success as a Toastmaster is the ultimate victory.

Sometimes clubs and members are unable to climb the ladder of success because of low membership and low morale. A Club Coach can help give you a boost. 

Each student learned how to hone his or her public speaking skills and identify various aspects of a good speech, like gestures, voice modulation, and body language as well as how to evaluate the Adult Keynote Speakers.

Key elements of leadership, including how to conduct elections and proper parliamentary procedures for President, Vice President, Secretary and Sergeant-at-arms, were covered in the program.

Three to four students prepared a speech every week and all participated in table topics sessions. Several of the graduates expect to continue attending the meetings, which has encouraged parents to attend a Speechcraft and regular Toastmaster meetings.
