Glenn Yasukochi, DTM Slowing Down the Game

In baseball, it's called slowing down the game. It is the reason we joined Toastmasters, and it is the key to our success. The rookie batter hears the roar of 50,000 fans. He is thinking about all of the combinations of pitches he may be thrown: from fastball, curveball, and slider to location such as outside, inside, low or high, including the speed of the pitch, fastball or changeup. All of this, not counting the perfect swing to hit the ball. The world of baseball, for the ballplayer, is very fast -an adrenaline rush. When the game appears to be very fast, the player tightens up and is unable to use full access to the brain.

In contrast, the veteran stays relaxed and is not rushed when the ball is put in play. Experience is the most common way to slow the game down. Through years of making mental and physical mistakes, the veteran learns to slow the game down; he knows beforehand what to do in certain situations. When he is in that zone everything moves at a slower pace, like he has all the time in the world to make his move.

You might be asking yourself, "Why can't I just make myself calm and relaxed without

the challenges?"Adrenaline is a body's natural response to stress, anger or fear. Taking on challenges teaches our mind and body how to put things into a proper perspective. Knowing what you are supposed beforehand will dramatically slow the game down because there is less pressure in split-second decision making.

When I first gave my Ice Breaker speech, there were 20 members present, but I felt like the rookie batter in front of that crowd of 50,000. Every speech I have given, from my Ice Breaker, to participation in speech contests makes me more confident that I will deliver a speech that is the best of my ability rather than one that will just get me by without embarrassing myself. From club President to Division Governor, I learned not to panic or overreact, but to pause for just a moment, and evaluate the situation before reacting.

Slowing the game down doesn't mean you stop being nervous. It does mean you are in control of the situation. I believe most major league ballplayers want to make it to the postseason. The elite ballplayer is not driven to the postseason solely by the prospect of money or fame, but by challenge of overcoming the adrenaline and using his training to slow the game down.

So go out and tell your fellow members and prospective members if they are willing to give speeches beyond the club and take leadership roles beyond club president, they will ultimately reap the greatest benefit of all: being in total control of their own destiny in their family, work and social life. Because anything is achievable after they have learned to slow the game down.
