Congratulations Jamel Thomas!

Founder's District's is exceptionally proud of Jamel Thomas who made it to the final round of the Toastmaster's International Semi-Final Speech Contest at the 80th Annual Toastmasters International Convention in Vegas.

Jamel attained one of nine places in the finals of the 73rd World Championship of Public Speaking held on 20 August 2011. He evolved through a six-month process of elimination, to become one of the top nine finalist out of a pool of 30,000 competitors in 116 countries.

Jamel's journey began with winning the speech contest at his home club, ISD Toastmasters Club #585096 in Downey, CA. He then competed at the Area E2 contest and advanced to the Division E contest. He won the division speech contest and advanced to the Founder's District International Speech contest held on April 16, 2011.

After winning the district level contest, Jamel practiced his speech "The But Stops Here" at a number of clubs and demonstration meetings, and consulted past speech contest winners to prepare for the Toastmasters International speech contest. It was this inspirational speech that entertained the crowd at the Semifinals in Las Vegas and saw him move on to the finals.

In the final round of the competition a panel of 14 Toastmasters judges evaluated the finalists on a range of criteria, including speech content, organization, voice quality and gestures. The speeches could cover any topic and had to last between five and seven minutes.

For the finals, Jamel gave another inspiring speech that shared insights on the recent attack on the education for underprivileged youth. His speech described the tribulations he endured and how the Pell Grant gave him and his sister a pathway to a brighter future.

Originally from Belton, Texas Thomas is an Applications Developer for Los Angeles County. Jamel had this to say of his experience as a high level competitor: "This was a definitely a learning experience. I learned so much about myself as well as Toastmasters. I am grateful for the opportunity and I look forward to competing again next year."

The speech contest marked the highlight of the four-day <u>Toastmasters</u> <u>International Convention</u> and drew a capacity audience of more than 2,000 people from around the world. Jock Elliott of Bongaree, Queensland, Australia was crowned the 2011 World Champion of Public Speaking.

Ferrari-D'Angelo, DTM, our immediate-past District Governor was honored at the Hall of Fame ceremony during the Toastmasters International Convention in Las Vegas, Nevada on Thursday, August 18, 2011, as recognition for her outstanding contribution to Toastmasters International.

The Toastmasters International Board of Directors conveyed to Ede its sincerest congratulations on the 2010-2011 achievements of the Founder's District reaching the designation of **Distinguished District.** This has not happened since 2007. As the District Governor, Ede has successfully led the District team to meet and exceed its goals, truly exemplifying the Toastmasters International mission and vision.

In addition, Toastmasters International congratulated *Wes Hoover*, DTM, our current District Governor and immediate-past Lt. Governor of Education and Training for earning **Excellence in Education and Training**, and commended *Richard Elliott*, DTM, our immediate-past Lt. Governor of Marketing for achieving **Excellence in Marketing**. "Take time to celebrate these accomplishments as it will also serve as an important foundation for our success this year," commented Wes. "I'm truly excited about our great start into the new year."

To reach the Distinguished District designation, Founder's District achieved critical goals in membership growth, club growth and educational accomplishments in the program year that began on July 1, 2010 and ended on June 30, 2011. The District developed and submitted to World Headquarters a District Success Plan and a Division/Area Governor Training Report with 85% of Division and Area Governors trained. The District grew the number of membership payments by more than 2% over 2009-2010, and achieved a net club growth of more than 3%. Additionally the number of Competent Communicator awards exceeded 3.5% of the District's membership dues payments for 2009-2010, and the number of Advanced Communicator awards exceeded 1% of the District's membership dues payments for 2009-2010.

District Recognition

Many Toastmasters members and groups deserve recognition for their achievements. World Headquarters and individual districts offer a variety of recognition programs and awards.

First, World Headquarters recognizes those districts that achieve their Distinguished District goals:

The Distinguished Programs recognize those areas, divisions and districts that meet Toastmasters International's growth and educational goals. The Distinguished Programs, which begin July 1 and end June 30 of each year, recognize performance excellence through the achievement of various goals. The programs also serve as management tools for membership recruitment and retention strategies, club growth, and educational award achievement.

Second, Toastmasters districts may recognize their own members locally for individual achievements:

Each district has the option to present three awards to its leaders who have helped to advance the district's success. The Toastmaster of the Year award, the Division Governor award and the Area Governor award may be presented by districts as warranted.



Music in his Soul....

H. Al Richardson, DTM, PID, PDG, Toastmaster since 1957!

H Al Richardson (alias H. Al), one of the longest serving Distinguished Toastmasters of Founder's District, is moving to Kansas. In the interview H. Al's first words were "I am really a musician. That was my first job

and first love - and what brought me to California in1938."

In August 2011 H.A. will have been a TM for 54 years and 6 months. He says he has grown personally with Toastmasters. He founded and sponsored dozens of TM clubs (e.g. Club #407, the Past District Governor's Club, Club #9, the Professional Speakers Club, and Club #3292 the JPL/Caltech Toastmasters Club); and has served a myriad of other leadership positions including Founders District Governor (PDG) in 1964-65; Past International Director (PID) in 1979-81; and in 1977, he received a Toastmaster's Presidential Citation. He says he especially likes Toastmasters because of being able to hone his presentation skills and developing many long-term friendships.

H. Al Richardson was born on Dec.11, 1920, in Belding, Michigan. He received his early childhood education in both Lowell and Belding, Michigan. By age 16, H. Al was an expert with the Hawaiian lap steel guitar. He studied guitar at the Honolulu Conservatory of Music from 1936-38. In 1937, he became a certified instructor with a Fort Wayne Indiana guitar studio teaching 500 students and playing two radio broadcasts a week.In 1938, H. Al moved to California to accept an offer from Gaston

Fator Guitar Studios in Los Angeles to open a branch studio as manager and teacher of the Hawaiian steel guitar. In 1939, he resigned to attend Pasadena City College, where he studied Mechanical Engineering and musical harmony. He soon left there, and he and his dad began to work at the Goeggenheim Aeronautical Laboratory California Institute of Technology (GALCIT) testing rocket engines at the jet propeller lab (JPL). He eventually joined the JPL Speakers' Bureau giving presentations on rocket and space flight programs.

On February 1, 1957, one of his friends invited him to join Toastmasters (TM), and he did, to hone his presentation skills, to learn to evaluate his own performance, and for speaking opportunities.

H. Al personally knew Dr. Ralph C. Smedley, the founder of Toastmasters International. "Dr. Smedley was reserved, well spoken, quiet, articulate, caring and helpful." he said.

H. Al shared three of his favorite quotes:

- (1) "Never give up," by Winston Churchill:
- (2) "If you are in a 'hole' of trouble, stop digging" (anonymous); and
- (3) "When you know what you want, and you want it badly enough, you will find a way to get it," by Jim Rohn.

H. Al's advice to current-day Toastmasters is to study the manuals, prepare carefully, listen, volunteer to help others and practice, practice, practice. "I strongly recommend Toastmasters to others, and to serve youth who badly need communication and leadership skills during their lifetime," he advised passionately.

Happily, with a laugh, H. Al said it was such a great treat to hear the farewell song and guitar piece played for him at his send-off party, by 80-year-old Rod Johnston, DTM, noted guitarist and Toastmaster from Iowa and now a member of Golden Seniors onthe-Move Toastmasters Club in Anaheim, CA. "When I heard about H. Al's leaving California for Kansas and his passion for playing the Hawaiian lap steel guitar, the spirit moved me to create the song and play the guitar for H. Al., at the send-off party sponsored by Club #9, The Professional Speaker's Club, in Anaheim.

H. Al asks his many friends, whom he is leaving behind, to pray for his good health to return; an active mind; and ways to help others.

A thirty year journey with Toastmasters

I was 30 years old and a mother of two young boys when I finished my undergraduate degree and secured a job with a multi-national manufacturer. I took a position as an Accountant in a department with a very experienced manager but within a few months I was promoted to supervisor while she was away on a medical leave. I was unprepared to lead a team of people.

I LEARNT OFTEN THROUGH MAKING MISTAKES, BUT SOMEHOW IT SEEMED WORTHWHILE.

A few weeks into a disastrous start, my company held a new club demonstration meeting that I attended. I have to admit joining Toastmasters was a leap of faith since I was not clear about what it would do for me but I saw I could form some relationships across the firm with people who might be able to help me in my job.

I headed back to graduate school at night and participated in all of the opportunities in my new club. I worked diligently on my speeches, volunteered to be a club officer, and attended District events and trainings.

The job lasted a little over two years before waves of lay-offs took it away. I relocated within southern California to get re-employed quickly and I found a new Toastmaster club. This time I joined a specialty club who drew its members from the Mensa organization. The pace was quick, the people interesting, and it met in the evening so I was able to attend regularly.

My life was very full with children, graduate school, and a chaotic job but somehow I hung onto Toastmasters as part of my personal growth program. You can imagine my surprise when a very experienced leader asked me to be the next Area Governor. Absolutely not! Since I declined, he made me what I called "the devil's deal". He had already served as a District Governor and he would come back to our area to be the governor for a year if I would promise to do step forward the following year. I admired the commitment on his part I agreed. All year long Herb Stockinger, a Past District Governor, showed me how to be a good Area Governor organizing council meetings, contests and club visits. Of course, I kept my word and became an Area Governor the next year.

My year as an area governor was not great nor was it bad. Some of the clubs in my area were healthy and some were struggling. I learned often through making mistakes but somehow it seemed worthwhile. My life upended again as I moved once more, took my next career opportunity and remarried.

With even less time on my hands, I decided I needed to start a club at my work so I didn't have to give up an evening and so I could attend where it was convenient for me. Starting a club was an enjoyable experience and it launched me into one of my continuing passions, new club development. I have since started close to 70 new clubs.

The following year I was eager to become a Division Governor. There were 40 clubs in my division with 8 area governors to assist. If there was a pivotal year in my leadership development I would have to say it was this particular year. The area governors were far more experienced in directing a team than I was and they were generous in their guidance. The feedback I received from them was immeasurable. I was promoted at work at the end of the year right after being



named the District's Division Governor of the Year. What a thrill!

Since that time I moved up through the District Offices...District Treasurer, New Club Marketing Chair, dipping my toes into district leadership until I finally jumped into the Lt. Governor of Marketing position, Education, and finally District Governor.

In 1993, as Lt. Governor of Education & Training, we conducted a quality review of Division club officer training and thought we would try a consolidated district training with division make-up sessions. Leadership and Communication Education (LACE) was held for the first time in the historic Methodist Church building in the city of Orange.

I changed jobs one more time taking an entrepreneurial position in a small firm. All of my Toastmaster training equipped me to take full advantage of the opportunities it provided. I managed diverse and talented people. I joined three boards as a director. I negotiated corporate acquisitions of other firms and I was invited to speak across the US for professional conferences. My efforts were rewarded well financially. I even started another club where I worked. I still served in club offices and I gave speeches regularly.

It has been nearly a 30 year journey. I gained two more academic credentials after graduate school and I taught part-time at the University for more than 8 years. None of those life experiences or accomplishments would have been possible without becoming a student of Toastmasters. It was a tenuous step initially but a sure-footed race to the finish.



In a life changing interview with Dr Pat Adelekan I learned much from this wonderful, strong, caring, and accomplished woman and mentor, whose life is all about helping others grow and learn. As a rookie Toastmaster it was enlightening to listen to a seasoned educator give her perspective on the Toastmaster educational path. Here are some of her words of wisdom:

"Toastmasters is another educational institute which has been researched, tried, and found true. It teaches people to cope. For me getting a DTM is like getting another PhD. If people only knew that Toastmaster's is a much more affordable education. You get experience in communication, leadership, research and education, especially with the High Performance Leadership program.

Everyone is a leader whether you like it or not. Someone is watching you and learning from you, as a parent, spouse, friend, co-worker... take on the leadership role.

If you don't know something at Toastmaster's, ask. If you do something, don't worry if you get it right or wrong, just learn from it. For example, take your speech, your evaluation and learn from it. You need to learn the basics. Go through the manuals, read them carefully; the speeches build on each other. Practice and repetition. It's like your multiplication tables - if you miss out on a set of tables you lose out on those basics. The world is open to so many learning opportunities. Find a mentor and then become one. Also give back and share. The Golden Seniors TM Club has the seniors sharing their knowledge and expertise.

In the leadership manuals one of the first lessons is listening... this is the key to life. Listening is key to communicating in work, play and relationships. At Toastmasters we are educated in the basic skills of life. No matter what stage you are in at Toastmaster's, listen and support each other. Evaluate others speeches as well as your own to develop critical thinking. Criticism is there to help you improve. Toastmaster's is about team building - Building a better quality of life, peace and harmony through communication.

Conflict is a part of life. It is necessary for change, It increases participation and leads to better decision making, innovation and rebuilding. Toastmasters teaches you how to get along with people, communicate, improve life and bond together.

Any accomplishment involves discipline. Toastmasters also teaches us discipline, evaluation, guidelines. Don't pander to people if they don't do the work, guide them to the right path. When you are evaluating a speech you are doing a person an injustice if you only pick the good parts.

Speak at different clubs. I have been to over 60 different clubs. I have been to clubs Internationally, Haiti, Spain, France, Nigeria as well as other states. Through Toastmaster's you meet people from all over the world and learn to communicate.

As John Lau, Toastmaster's first Asian International Director said, "Toastmaster values can be incorporated into everyday life." - all around the world." "

DISTINGUISHED CLUB PROGRAM

How the Program Works

The Distinguished Club Program is an annual program, running from July 1 through June 30. The program consists of 10 goals your club should strive to achieve during this time using the Club Success Plan as a guide.

World Headquarters tracks the progress of your club toward these goals throughout the year, sending quarterly progress reports to your club president. At year-end, World Headquarters calculates the number of goals the club achieved and recognizes it as a Distinguished Club, Select Distinguished Club, or President's Distinguished Club based on the number of goals achieved and the number of members in your club.

 Distinguished Club achieve 5 goals

- Select Distinguish Club achieve 7 goals
- President's Distinguished Club achieve 9 goals

What You Can Do

Download the <u>DCP Form</u> and fill out page 1 and page 2. Work with your club officers and club members to determine who will be accomplishing each goal this year. When the form is complete, send a copy to the Founder's District DCP Chair at the address on the second page. Make a copy for your own records. Each club officer should sign the first page as proof of participation in the Club Success Plan. This will help to fulfill the requirements for the Advanced Leader Bronze award.

WOODY and WOODETTE, THE WANDERING GAVELS

- Two (or more) Toastmaster members, from the same club, visit the target Club that currently holds Woody or Woodette.
 Please call ahead to the club VPE and announce your intent to visit and offer to participate in the program (Current club will be posted on Founders District Website).
- 2. The visiting Toastmasters must participate in the target club's meeting in some way.
- The visiting Toastmasters 'Capture' Woody or Woodette at the end of the meeting. They take the captured Traveling Gavel for display at their home club's next meeting.
- 4. As soon as the **Traveling Gavel** is captured, the visiting Toastmasters must announce Woody's or Woodette's new place of residence to Victoria DTM, District LGET, to be updated on the website.
- The Traveling Gavel will be displayed and used at each subsequent club meeting, or until it is captured by visiting Toastmasters from another club.
- Clubs may capture Woody or Woodette multiple times, but must allow two or more other clubs to capture Woody or Woodette in between its own captures.

How long will Woody stay with the Contrarians? The Contrarians boasted that, "We plan to keep it for 100 years:-)" All it takes is two members from your club to attend and participate at the current club's meeting in order to capture Woody.
