In Memory of Barbara Collins

The holiday season usually inspires me to write something very cheery for our newsletter; but this year, my Toastmaster club/Family, Watermeisters, #8951, lost a truly wonderful member. This loss has caused me to pause and reflect on the holidays and the people I care about in a completely different manner than I am acustomed. Losing a friend changes one's perspective rather quickly.

Barbara Collins had been a member of

Watermeisters since 1999 and came to every meeting with a smile, great humor, and a Boston accent that charmed everyone! A number of years ago, she had been diagnosed with cancer, but it didn't slow her down. She continued working at the Orange County

Sanitation District, taking part in community activities, and regularly attending Toastmaster meetings. She gave speeches and participated in Table Topics, and recently began a concerted effort to complete her DTM.

In October, Barbara gave a very moving speech where she examined her own life and regrets. She had realized that she had often afforded her coworkers and professional contacts with the greatest amount of patience and kindness, but often gave the people who mattered most to her—her family—much less than what "strangers" were receiving. She attributed the disparity to fatigue after a long day in the office; but realized that the people who deserved the most patience and kindness were family and she cautioned us all to remember that, lest we may someday feel the same regrets. She wistfully wished out loud for a do-over, knowing full well that wasn't going to happen. I don't think there was a dry eye in the room after Barbara finished; but she had made her point loud and clear. Give your loved ones the very best part of yourself.

Barbara attended one more meeting after this speech. She was in a meloncholy mood on that day and we spoke for a short time after the meeting had concluded. She explained that her

most recent round of tests with her oncologist revealed that her cancer, which had been under control for some time, was coming back with a vengeance. That was the last time I saw her.

The church where her funeral was held was filled to capacity with friends, family, and coworkers—all people that Barbara had touched during her life. I believe Barbara had been too hard on herself during her last speech. Unless you give love, you will not have

such an amazing display of love come back to you. She was a remarkable woman and she will be missed.

Beyond the Club

People join Toastmasters for a variety of reasons. A member might join to improve his public speaking, to improve her leadership skills, or even to become more proficient at social skills.

The club provides a safe learning environment in which it is okay to fail. Zig Ziglar said: "Anything worth doing, is worth doing poorly. Until you learn to do it well."

The "container" – the club

- has a boundary that might be thought of (pardon the physics analogy) as an "event horizon." Most members do not see past this "horizon."

Perhaps you think of your club as a "cocoon" in which you are safe. Your club members support you in your self-improvement quest. You are quite comfortable in this cocoon.

However, there is Toastmaster life outside your

club. There are other clubs that have different "personalities" from that of your club. Your Vice President of Education might arrange a speaker / evaluator exchange with another club that meets at the same or at a similar time. You might even contact a club on your own and ask if it can contact you if one of their speakers or evaluators cancels. If you take advantage of such an opportunity, you will learn more about Toastmasters, and you will have a chance to network with other Toastmaster members.

The District schedules events other than club meetings. Such events include LACE training (coming in January), area and division speech contests (coming in March and April), club officer phone conferences (coming in January and February), and the District Conference

> (coming in April). Each of these events gives you an opportunity for selfenrichment of some kind.

Some activities outside your club will not only enable your personal growth but also allow you to add value to others. Helping a struggling club by being a club coach or by participating with your club in adopting another club will bring you the joy of improving the Toastmasters experience for other people. Participating in starting a new club by

providing a club lead or by championing the creation of a club at your workplace will give you the satisfaction and excitement of bringing the Toastmasters self-improvement opportunity to more people.

Once you are comfortable in your club's cocoon, venture outside the club's event horizon. The events beyond the club will provide opportunities to expand your personal horizons.

Robotics and Remarkable Results Mark the Founder's District 2016 Fall Conference



By Steve Itzkowitz, CC, CL It was bound to happen. The members that attended the 2016 Founder's District Fall Conference at the Sheraton

Hotel in Cerritos, CA were bound to feel full and satisfied once the festivities were completed. No, it wasn't the chicken marsala, caesar salad, vegetable lasagna, steamed vegetables, bread, tiramisu, chocolate-covered strawberries and cookies that filled attendees up, although that didn't hurt. Rather, it was all the wonderful benefits of Toastmasters the attendees were reminded of and all the nuggets of wisdom they received from the keynote speaker of the day, Craig Valentine, as well as the Communication and Leadership award recipient, USC roboticist, Maja Mataric, Ph.D.

In regard to the keynote speech provided by Craig, the first thing that was very apparent about him is how keenly he understands how to be an effective leader, which was a great discussion point for Toastmaster members who are well aware that Toastmasters is where leaders are made. He discussed the differences between average leaders and great leaders with this nugget of wisdom being the one that tied that part of his address together:

Average leaders place blame. Above average leaders take it. They also share credit and take blame. There were all sorts of other nuggets, but what he stated above is really the crux of how effective leaders work. It's one of the primary benefits of being involved in Toastmasters leadership at any level because the more responsibility you take and the more credit you share, the more opportunities you will have to grow in and out of Toastmasters. Craig even threw in some sales training in which he mentioned that when it comes to selling, which every leader has to do, the key to success in that is knowing what to do and what not to do.

Never sell a product. Only sell the results.

Apply that to selling Toastmasters to a prospective member in the following scenarios:

Scenario #1: "Toastmasters offers opportunities to its members to give prepared

give prepared speeches, impromptu speeches as well as evaluations and to be evaluated by other members as part of his or her development as a public speaker and leader."

As one can see,

that scenario is rich in describing some of the features of being in Toastmasters. However, no results were offered as part of describing those features.

Scenario #2: "Involvement in Toastmasters is going to dramatically improve your public speaking and leadership skills to the point where you'll develop prepared speaking,





impromptu speaking and evaluation skills that will lead to furthering your career no matter what it is, which will have a positive impact on your lifestyle and the lives of the people in your life."

As Craig said, never sell the product. Only sell the results. Of all the nuggets of wisdom to take away from Craig's keynote address and the afterlunch workshop he conducted as well, below is the main one that every Toastmaster should take to heart as part of becoming the most impactful public speaker and leader they can be:

Craft a story and make a point.

The story is how the speaker is going to initially connect with the audience. The point the speaker makes about the story is what the audience can take with them and apply to their daily lives. That's the crux of effective public speaking that was very simply put by Craig in a way that was easy for each attendee to understand and run with right away. He also discussed the importance of developing a foundational phrase of 10 words or less in order to be crystal clear as to what the message is the speaker wants the audience to heed to their own benefit. That's because, as Craig put it so eloquently:

No phrase. No stage.

Of course, a lot of the success Toastmasters have in anything they do is a direct result of the company Toastmasters keep. There was an anecdote that Craig gave during his keynote presentation that highlighted this crucial element of success and that he summed up in three simple words:

Find your Steve.

In the anecdote Craig gave, a man named Steve was the encourager for another person as that person was pursuing something worthwhile.

In the end, we all learned from Craig what being a leader means, how to give an effective speech in terms of storytelling that comes with a point, the importance of creating a foundational phrase, how to sell and who to surround ourselves with as we build our legacies in and out of Toastmasters.

In terms of Maja's presentation on robotics, she addressed a concern that every human being has in regards to robots being used more and more to do the work that sometimes human beings aren't interested in doing, particularly from the standpoint of physical work. It points out that human beings have gotten much too reliant on technology, especially as a means of communicating with others. As such, she is working on a major undertaking of developing socially-assistive robotics. Believe it or not, these are robots that will help human beings who



are a little uncomfortable communicating with others in more traditional ways become more comfortable in terms of traditional interpersonal and public communication.

As Maja put it, "If we aren't social beyond a screen, we're dead." She even provided

startling statistics on strokes in which she pointed out there are about 800,000 strokes per day. She predicted those numbers will double in the next 5 years because of how increasingly sedentary we are becoming in society in which we spend the majority of the day in front of screens whether sitting in front of a computer at work, at home, at Starbucks, or constantly looking at our smartphones for the latest updates on our friends' lives, checking email or looking for information on something of interest like sports, business or politics.

What these 2 critical aspects of the 2016 Founder's District Fall Conference point to is the best reason to join and get fully involved in all aspects of Toastmasters from attending club meetings to attending district events and everything in between. That's because members are constantly being trained and reminded of how much of an edge they are gaining by committing themselves to Toastmasters through the non-stop nuggets of wisdom they gain and can apply to their lives no matter what event they may attend. At the end of the day, every Toastmasters event is time well spent because there's is always plenty of new nuggets of wisdom to learn and even more to be excited about.

On to the 2017 Founder's District Spring Conference, which will take place April 21-22, 2017 at the Sheraton Hotel in Cerritos. It's going to be a must-attend for all Founder's District members as well as members of the new Century District.

Then the Founders District Community Relations Committee Judges Bureau has opportunities for you to spread your wings.

The purpose of the Founder's District Community Relations Committee Judges Bureau is to provide community service organizations and educational institutions with well-trained, impartial, and professional quality judges for their youth speech contests. The judges sent by the Bureau have been well trained in the organization's contest rules and judging criteria and give fair and unbiased scores based on those rules. When the results of the contest are read, the contestants, contest organizers, and audience are certain that the winners were well-deserved and best represent their organization.

Examples of community contests:

- Academic Decathlon (3-level event for high school students)
- National Management Association Speech Contest (4-level event for high school students)
- Lions Club Speech Contest (5-level event for high school students)
- Future Business Leaders of America (for high school and college students academic events)
- National Society of Black Engineers

How to Decide on Speech Topics

What on earth am I going to talk about? It seems I've exhausted everything I know, so

what's left? If this goes through your mind the moment you see you are scheduled to give a talk, you are not alone.

What is surprising is you have an unlimited amount of material you haven't even begun to tap. Here are some things to think about if you think you have run out of ideas.

Things you like. These can be anything from foods to books to travel and Toastmasters. Talk about your favorite restaurant. What makes it so special? Share a favorite recipe and bring along some specific spices or ingredients you can share with your audience. The possibilities are endless.

About books, there are lessons to be learned and adventures to explore. What touches you can in turn touch and encourage others to read the book. You can create an entire talk about what you like about your favorite author and why. What are you passionate about? What are your hobbies and interests away from work?

Perhaps there are particular places that excite you. Think about a recent trip and share the details and a vivid description with the audience. Interesting places you visit are an excellent source of topics.

Every day you have experiences, some good, some not so good, but all potential subjects for a speech. Think about how you can dramatize what you have experienced. Add a quote or a joke to make it interesting and use gestures to dramatize your points.

What about the time you joined Toastmasters? What motivated you to join? What was your experience like? Who was your mentor? And what have you gained so far? What do you hope to accomplish? This can be an endless source of material for a talk.

Is there a challenge you are facing? You can talk about your plan for a resolution. Others might be facing the same challenge.

Have you seen a great movie or play? Heard something of interest on the news? Or did you read an interesting article in a magazine or newspaper? Have you bought a new item? Learning to use a new IPad, IPhone or laptop? If so, share your experiences.

You get the idea. The sources are endless. Instead of panic or worrying about what you don't know, look at what you do know. Draw on your knowledge and be creative. Then act confidently and deliver. You will surprise yourself and your listeners.

P stands for presentation

D stands for distribution, which is all about marketing

S stands for system that Norma explains is how professional speakers can build their careers and record what progress they are making

George Cassar was the last featured speaker. He is a Dale Carnegie instructor in which he presented the 5 drivers of success, which are as follows:

- 1. Self-confidence
- 2. Strengthening relationships
- 3. Listening
- 4. Enhancing communication
- 5. Reduce stress and worry

With all the outstanding content that each attendee received during the Smedley

Anniversary party, one would think that each attendee spent thousands of dollars just to attend as they certainly received thousands of dollars worth of valuable information from some of the best professional public speakers out there.

Each attendee paid \$0 to attend and left feeling like a million bucks and satisfied.

This is the story of Jerry Vincent, one of the participants in Speaking of Glory Speechcraft Workshop that was held from October 18 thru November 22, 2016 at Azusa Pacific University, who in his darkest moment did not give up and lose hope. The SpeechCraft Coordinator was Vernon Budinger who led the Speechcraft Workshop to achieve his Advanced Communicator Gold award. Peter Morrison, another SpeechCraft participant was always integral and played an important role in Jerry Vincent's journey of never giving up and having faith and HOPE!

Let's wind the clock back!

Jerry Vincent whom everyone calls Vince after losing his wife to cancer, was finally able to stabilize his life. He was financially stable, had a nice house and car. However, he noticed one day that his fingers started rolling over each other uncontrollably. When the uncontrolled movement worsened, he visited the doctor only to return with the devastating news that he had Parkinson's Disease and the prognosis that it would slowly take over his life and that in a few years he would be bedridden.

The doctors were right about the severity of the disease but very wrong about the time it would take for him to become an invalid. He was bedridden in NINE months. He lived in pain every day. His body became week and his muscles writhed uncontrollably in his arms and legs. He lost everything both physical and spiritual – his car, house, his body and his life as he knew it. He even lost all of his TEETH! He became depressed and his pain was unrelenting. He was contemplating having a tracheotomy so that he could breath. Twice, he almost called for the morphine kit to end his own life. And yes, twice he decided to keep going, to keep moving – one day at a time. That was his ultimate goal, to make it through that one day. He just wanted to make it through "Today."

He began writing poems and invented activities to take his mind off his condition. He began studying treatments for Parkinson's Disease and discovered a new device from Medtronic that uses Deep Brain Stimulation to force the body to deliver dopamine to the nervous system. He and his friend badgered and harassed his doctor until the doctor relented and approved the surgery for him. He moved to Pomona to be closer to the treatment center and underwent three operations on three successive days to install the wires and devices in his brain that would hook him up to the mechanical device to regulate his body. The treatment was successful. He was given a second chance at life. Immediately after the treatment he had an epiphany. He realized that he had almost killed himself twice for no reason. FOR NO **REASON, HE ALMOST KILLED HIMSELF** TWICE.

It was then that he realized that he was given his greatest gift – the realization that we are always alive – we always have a chance AS LONG AS WE HAVE HOPE!!!! He has learned to live his life one step at a time – and even though he was still homeless, he felt that he had a new life. He decided to spread this message – he wanted to tell as many people as possible that HOPE is the key.

His first step on this journey was to walk with his backpack from the full length of California, from Mexican border to the border with Oregon. It was through this journey that he began to realize that God was working in his life. He was camping in Big Sur when the ranger came up to his tent, opened the flap and told him that he had visitors from India. He did not believe this at first – visitors from India? A family in India had seen his story in the news and decided to travel to California to talk to him about his treatment. Somehow, they had tracked him down after they got to the US and finally found him at Big Sur. They had many long conversations. On the following day, he found a note on his tent with a drawing.

He began to live his dreams. One of the goals on his bucket list was to visit Pebble Beach Golf Course – one of the most famous golf courses in the world. He did not golf, he just wanted to visit it. As he entered the 17-mile Drive, he started looking for ways to enter the course area. After he had walked for about two miles, he found a hole in the fence and spent the night under the stars on the 13th green, listening to the waves crashing from the ocean onto the rocky beach alongside the course.

God has saved him from disaster many times over. He was resting up at a campground in Oregon. He thought that he had pitched his tent on high ground and that he was safe from flooding. However, that night a torrential rain He had no choice but to jump and try to grab a branch on the other side of the creek. He was successful and pulled his backpack up to safety. As he was standing there soaking wet with no tent and no sleeping bag, he decided that he needed to head back to town.

The rain was unrelenting. He was completely soaked and cold. It was then that he stumbled on a brand new abandoned BMW. It still had the dealer's plates, but no windows and no wheels. That car had not been there the previous day. Luckily, it still had the back seat. He was able to use his hunting knife to cut up the back seat and make a poncho. He cut the leather wrap from the steering wheel and used it as a belt for the poncho. He was able to make it into the town and camped out in the lobby of the town's post office which was kept at a toasty 72 degrees even at night.

From here, he headed back to Southern California. He had reached near the Redwoods Park when a couple in a giant RV asked for directions. He gave them the information and they started talking. They asked him where he was going and he told them Ontario. They said they were headed there also and that they

began. He woke up to the sound of a train – sort of a Chug Chug Chug. He opened the tent and saw that he was surrounded by water – two creeks on either side of his tent were flooding. He quickly jumped out of the tent and realized that he would have to get across the flooding creek somehow. He

He was already up to his ankles in water and it was rising fast. would give him a ride. He hopped into the RV, it was one of the big luxurious RVs and he fell asleep in the couch behind the driver. When he woke up, he was looking at Mt. Shasta. He was in shock. He questioned why they had gone so far north. Their response was that they were going north to Canada, Ontario. He

then, explained that he wanted to go to city of Ontario in Southern California. As he was leaving the RV, he got a call on his cell phone – it was a doctor in Salt Lake City Utah who wanted to know if he would be willing to speak



to a group in Salt Lake. Of course, he responded in the affirmative since he was already in Northern California. He never would have accepted if that couple had not taken him on a detour. Another way that God had a hand in his journey!

Wind the clock forward!

God has clearly touched his life in so many ways. He is still homeless, but he feels inspired. He feels compelled to travel and tell his story – NEVER LOSE HOPE. He wants to inspire others. He has been invited to Thailand to tell his story and to inspire others – there is hope and do not lose FAITH!

His message: "When things look most grim, even when your life seems as if there is no hope, keep pushing forward one step at a time. Just make that next step until you have completed the next day. Then, get up and start over – take that next step. Do something that inspires you, little things. Write poetry, help a friend, or sing a song. Do whatever helps you to move forward!!! Remember, your possessions are not you. Your appearance is not you. Only you can take your own dignity – no one can take that from you. Start your journey – it will inspire you and it will definitively inspire others. To quote, "When the world says Give up, HOPE whispers…Try it one more time!"
