My Toastmaster Journey: From Member to District Director

My toastmaster journey, since June 2006, has steadily transformed me, from a quiet, private member to a confident leader, with continued growth in communication and leadership skills the way Dr. Ralph Smedley had envisioned — Learning by doing.

Direct experience and skills I gained form each leadership role I served have prepared me well to serve as the District Director of this legendary Founder's District.

You might ask, "What are my keys to success?"

Many factors contribute to my success. Let me name a few.

Personal Background and Strength

Coming from a three-generation toastmaster, my passion in toastmaster has been planted by my father's friendly club environment in the late 1960s and, later, enhanced by my daughter's promotion at work from her improved technical presentation skill in the early 2000s.

To me learning is fascinating and energizing. I also find it rewarding helping others learn and grow.

Toastmasters International values—Integrity, Respect, Service, and Excellence are exactly what my parents have instilled in me since childhood.

My education and work experience in the planning field also serve me well in goal setting, coordination with groups from diverse backgrounds, and how to incorporating feedbacks into the planning process, to achieve goals.

Toastmasters Leadership Experiences

Having served three terms as club vice president Education and one term as Club President at Tools 2 Lead Club 921159, I gained enough confidence to step up to division and district leadership roles.

- Appointed by Division Director Sawarnjit Singh as **Division Public Relations Chair**, I learned to publish press release, on division speech contest winners, for the first time.
- Appointed by Division Governor Dan Cossack as **Division Contest Chair**, I gained confidence from assembling multiple teams of leaders from my Tools 2 Lead Club to chair and support venue/facilities, food, registration, contest, and opportunity drawing, attracting 100+ members and guests.
- Appointed by District Governor Ede Ferrari D'Angelo as **Area Governor** and by Division Governor Harry Yan as **Assistant Division Director**, I shadowed Harry who demonstrated to me a wide range of leadership skills, from the Toastmaster mentoring program to conflict resolution.
- As **Division Governor**, I soon found out that not all five area governors were able to attend all required meetings or to contribute their fair share of Division responsibilities at events such as speech contests and new club launch meetings. I reached out for help from other area governors.

- Appointed by Lt Governor Education and Training Harry Yan as **LACE Co-Chair**, I had the opportunity to stretch my planning skills in assembling and leading, fabulous teams of leaders in organizing two LACE events, offering a wide variety of practical topics for members.
- Appointed by District Governor Harry Yan I served as **Public Relations Officer (PRO)**, the role that was way outside my comfort zone. Immediate Past PRO Dan Cossack helped me gain new skills, how to CONNECT with all members via E-blasts, E-newsletters, and social media.
- As I was ready to step up to run for the roles of the District Trio, I learned for the first time—how to campaign, producing vision statement, flyer, website, Facebook page, with the help of many including Harry Yan, Marie Hulett, and Frannie Stein.

As **Lieutenant Governor Marketing** my dream team of leaders successfully chartered 22 new clubs. 4 new club teams from 8 divisions; organizing 4 successful marketing workshops withseveral past district governors as presenters and facilitators.

As Program Quality Director, the focus was on my favorite subject—training—club officers at LACE and offer variety of choices for members, train area/division directors- making training more interactive; and planning for the district conference. We had 128 distinguished clubs that year, hence, I received an Award of Excellence in Program Quality from the Toastmaster International President.

As **District Director** this year, I have grown in more ways that I could ever imagined, having deeper and broader understanding of the Founder's District. The fresh insights into the District leadership dynamics together with the members accomplishments, and diverse points of view have enriched my perspective of the world. My Toastmaster passion has grown in leaps and bounds.

Support from My Clubs

Significant part of my success comes from the generous support from all five clubs I have the pleasure of serving as member, namely **Tools 2 Lead Club 921159** (2006-2012), **Vineyard Journeys Club** 1507645 (2010-present), **Smedley Club Chapter One Club** (2012-2014), **Le Gourmet Toastmasters Club 317** (2012-present), **Past District Governors/Directors Club** 407 (2014-present).

Support from Outside My Clubs

Throughout my Toastmaster journey, I have regularly identified naturally talented and potential leaders, whether at club, area, division, district, or international levels. I looked for team players and reliable leaders. Along the way, I have transformed potential leaders into dynamic leaders.

Many experienced toastmasters, including Dan Cossack (Webmaster), Marie Hulett (Editor-in-Chief), Avis French (Community Outreach), Richard and Linda Daugherty (Photographers), Deborah Reisdorph (LACE), Frannie and Norm Stein, John Barry and Marshall Northcott (New Clubs), Linda Robinson (District Conference), have provided invaluable support to the District during my terms.

In addition to my advisor Harry Yan, several past district governors, namely Lou Ann Frederick (mentoring), John Angiolillo (Data/Directory Chair), Richard Snyder (Special Assistant), Bob Hudack (Club Alignment), Colette Gardner (Operation Manuals and Pathways), and Alfred Herzing (Candidate Showcase) have directly or indirectly expanded my perspective, knowledge, and confidence in my leadership journey. One critical support I secured before I set my sight for the District Director was from my husband, **Ranong**, a non-toastmaster, who has chauffeured me around and moved heavy and numerous supplies to all the District events that I needed to attend without any complaints.

There you have it—my journey from a member to district director, which has started from a CHARTER MEMBER in 2006, and now the Founder's DISTRICT DIRECTOR. I have grown leaps and bounds from a planner who was confident only in giving project presentations to meetings—full of planners and engineers—to a confident leader who is not afraid to speak to any size of audience and any combination of demographics.

The toastmaster seed planted in me has spread to many seeds I have planted along the way, I am GRATEFUL to many of you for being my water, nutrients, and my sunshine. Public Speaking as the Ultimate Form of Service

With the end of yet another year for Toastmasters very close, there was a revelation that came out of the Founder's District spring Leadership and Communication Experience that is sure to set the tone for the near year that will begin in less than 3 weeks. Speaking is a service.

It was the underlying message of the keynote address delivered by the Founder's District International Speech Competition Champion and professional speaker/ trainer, Daniel Midson-Short, in which the focus of his speech was about emerging speakers and the lessons he has learned on the path to becoming a professional speaker.

To go along with a rather profound message of proclaiming that speaking is a service by which value is added to the members of an audience, Daniel offered up some great tips and suggestions for anyone that is serious about delivering more speeches out of Toastmasters as a professional speaker.

The first set of tips is encompassed in a simple number:

100

What that number symbolizes is

the number of times to do the same speech once it's developed to eventually lead anybody to becoming a full-fledged professional speaker. After all, practice does make perfect and a lot of success in public speaking to infer from Daniel's advice is repetition, repetition, repetition. Or, as Daniel put it, consistency and volume leads to speaking greatness.

That said, he went even deeper in his advice for emerging speakers regardless of where an individual speaker may be in their particular development by informing the audience of the 3 keys to going from 0 to giving the same speech 100 times. Those include:

- 1. Know your topic
- 2. Find the audience that will be most receptive to the message of your speech
- 3. Deliver those 100 speeches on the same topic.

He also mentioned that getting known for a particular topic, regardless of the subject matter, can lead to other people finding audiences for that speaker, which can really spark a career in public speaking when it comes to frequency of opportunities to deliver a speech.

As important as the aforementioned tips are, it's even more important to develop the right mindset to ensure success as an emerging professional speaker. Fortunately for the audience, Daniel had words of wisdom to offer by pointing out the mistakes often made by rookie professional speakers.

- 1. Trying to be perfect.
- 2. Thinking it's about the speaker

through worrying about such things as physical appearance or having a high level of nerves because a bunch of eyes are looking at you. As a speaker, it's important to devote all your energy and passion towards the audience and not worry about details that only the speaker is concerned about.

3. Not listening. What Daniel meant by that is how aware is the speaker of the mannerisms of the audience as he or she is delivering his or her speech. These mannerisms can include nodding, falling asleep, audience members turning away,

human moments that we all experience in this life.

At the end of the day, and in the part of Daniel's keynote address that offered up the most crucial advice he can offer to emerging professional speakers was advice centered around what matters most when it comes to giving a speech.

- 1. Audience response
- 2. Clear consistent message



3. Connecting with the audience
That's because what audience members take away from any professional speaker's talk that could add value to their lives is the whole point of effective public speaking. That's why a clear consistent message is very crucial to being successful in that endeavor.

All in all, those that joined Toastmasters to not only improve their

public speaking skills, but to take those skills and parlay them into professional opportunities got more than their money's worth from one of the best in the business. Now, it's time for those emerging speakers to put the information into practice and make Founder's District proud as Daniel certainly has done with his contest speaking and now his professional speaking.

Then, the service that is public speaking will always shine through and Toastmasters along with Founder's District will continue to touch the lives of others in such an empowering and enriching way.

audience members who are distracted, folded arms and legs and other signs that the audience can offer up to let the speaker know how much they may or may not be engaged by what the speaker is saying.

Of course, the most successful speakers are the ones that can engage the audience in a way that is humorous. That humor, according to Daniel, is brought out by simply being real and the speaker sharing real stories about himself or herself that will help the audience relate to the speaker that much better because it's amazing how much audience members and a public speaker may share in common in terms of those

As I reflect back to my 2016-2017 District Director journey—the Expand Your Horizons journey, I feel gratified and satisfied with what we have accomplished from our collaboration.

We set our priority to the most basic approach—"Members first" and sticking to the core values of Integrity, Respect, Service, and Excellence.

2. Assistant Area/Division Directors We encouraged area and division directors to appoint up to two assistants and we trained all of them together with area/division directors. As a result, we have a qualified

> replacement each time a director resigns. We also have leaders ready to step up for next year. We also persuaded **Toastmasters** International to authorize name bases or all assistants.

3. District Executive Council or DEC meeting - making our training and meeting more interactive among our division and area directors,

we found that not only we have effective collaboration experience, division directors and area directors team up to help each other at area and division events. Free admission to the meeting also helped. Results—we have a healthy quorum at every DEC meeting.

4. my.FoundersDistrict.org helps members track their own achievements as well as their club, area, and division.

What we have accomplished this year are many. Our number in May for membership payments, paid clubs, and distinguished clubs are well above the previous 6 years. We are on track to achieve Distinguished if our members continue to complete communication and leadership manuals, paying dues, and adding more clubs and members.



- 5. Inspired by Toastmasters International Midyear Training, Founder's District hosted the FIRST Founder's District Candidates Showcase, last Saturday, chaired by Past International President, Distinguished Toastmaster Alfred Herzing. We also provided a wide range of leadership exhibits chaired by Distinguished Toastmaster Frannie Stein. Even though it was an Easter weekend, 59 attended.
- 6. LACE In addition to a discount to members from clubs that had all 7 club officers attend previous LACE, we offered free of charge for club officers who don't require lunch. Result—many club officers were able to attend their required session and had time for their other priorities.
- 7. Reaching for the Stars to track not only members achievements on communication and leadership tracks, but also on participation in Toastmasters events. We had more members getting involved with District activities.

Time flies when you are having fun!

I am confident the next teams of leaders we have just elected on April 22nd will take our Founder's District, and the newly created District 100 to new heights. Continue to expand your horizons to benefit from what Toastmasters can offer.

Whether it is a formal meeting or a casual gathering, once she has arranged and set up the room with gifts, food, and learning materials, you will find Charlotte, at the back of the room looking out for the needs of every person, whether there are two or two-hundred people in the audience. Charlotte handles problems

before others even notice them.

Charlotte has had more than her share of challenges. What sets her apart is her resilience, her sunshine attitude and the way she transforms obstacles into opportunities. She triumphs over tragedy. When confronted with the struggles of both of her parents dealing with Parkinson's Disease, Charlotte founded what became an international support group known as PEP: Parkinson's Educational Program. What started out in Newport Beach, at Charlotte's Park Newport residence, quickly grew from 4 to 300 people and proliferated into satellite

support groups in every state in America, then expanded into 13 countries and five languages.

Charlotte provides the same "obstacles into opportunities" resourcefulness in Toastmasters. Her club, HarborLites, is all about supporting members' needs. She sees HarborLites as a "safe harbor" where individuals grow and develop in the presence of mutual nurturing and mentoring.

In 2014/2015, Charlotte's personal excellence earned for her the DTM – Distinguished Toastmaster,

which is the highest educational award. She was also recognized as Toastmaster of the Year and received the Area Governor of the Year Award. In 2015/2016 Charlotte was awarded 4 Triple Crown Awards, an unprecedented record.

To sum up what Lauren was talking about, being involved in Toastmasters long enough and showing up to special events on a regular basis will give members the benefit of extended family.



Our club may only be 3 years old, but we





Toastmasters
Find Their Why
at Founder's
District Spring
Conference

There were plenty of options that the 150 attendees of Founder's District last combined district conference could've pursued instead of actually attending the conference.

Attendees could've slept in, watched Saturday morning cartoons with their kids, painted the town red on Friday evening, ran errands or simply relaxed after a long, grinding week of work. Yet, they showed. Why?

Only those attendees knew that.

Whatever the "why" was, it was a very strong and a very indicative of the value they are gaining from Toastmasters and learning to apply to their everyday lives and the lives of others.

Keynote speaker and current International Director, Michael Osur, challenged each Toastmaster to identify their why for both joining and remaining in Toastmasters.

This kind of challenge gives great insight as to why people join and stay in Toastmasters.

Most people join Toastmasters to improve their public speaking skills. Each and every member that completes the competent communicator manual does improve significantly at public speaking because of the skills that each manual speech requires a member to

develop to be successful at that speech like vocal variety, getting to the point and speaking for inspiration.

However, Toastmasters loses 40% of its membership each renewal term. Why do the other 60% stay?

The predominant reason from Michael's talk was the relationships people develop while in Toastmasters and the opportunities outside of Toastmasters those relationships can and do lead to. These relationships start at the club level and then start to snowball when members are willing to step outside of their club to attend special events like an area contest, LACE, a district conference or the granddaddy event of them all, the International Convention, which is coming up soon.

That's when the power of Toastmasters really starts to permeate a member's soul about how Toastmasters can and will change their lives when they immerse themselves in ALL it has to offer.

And, the Founder's District's, as we know it, last Spring Conference offered more to its attendees than meets the eye in terms of reasons to show up.

The other keynote speaker, Past District Governor, Naomi Takeuchi, offered a workshop on building one's international network. The main idea being that when Toastmasters travel to no matter where it may be, chances are there are Toastmasters members and clubs in those locations that can make sure a traveling Toastmaster feels right at home. Talk about a HUGE benefit of being in Toastmasters.

Accredited speaker and past district governor, Sheryl Roush, offered a workshop entitled, "The Heart of Marketing" in which each attendee received a handout with some valuable information on how clubs can attract more prospective members and then convert those prospects into actual recruited members. One of the highlights of that handout are the 38 "buzz" words that clubs can use on their marketing genres that motivate prospects to take quicker action on joining a club through increasing sense of urgency including such words as "today," "safe," "amazing" and "breakthrough." Sheryl also shared information on creating amazing flyers and social media campaigns using these buzz words that will make the lives of club Vice Presidents of Public Relations much easier.

What's even better than that is the very same information a club Vice President of Public Relations can use to market his or Toastmasters club is the same information a business owner or entrepreneur can use to promote his or her business. It's just another benefit of being part of Toastmasters, which is learning skills that are transferrable to other crucial aspects of our lives like our careers.

There was even instruction on ballroom dancing, which added a lot of value to the conference. Then, there was the matter of Saturday night. Aside from enjoying a tasty dinner, conference attendees were treated to something that had never been presented in any prior Founder's District conference. That was live music.

With that in mind, Melissa Wong and Amy Oakes dazzled the audience with their soulful vocal ability. Mike O'Neil provided us with excellent guitar solos. The music show represented variety, talent and Toastmasters who are supremely talented in the art of music. In this program year (2016-2017), Steven:


- completed the coordinator role for a Speechcraft project,

In Loving Memory of Celly Adamo By Frank Adamo



Celly F. Adamo, DTM, PDG 2006-07, passed away peacefully Wednesday morning, June 7, 2017 at approximately 3:28 AM at the Los Alamitos Medical Center. She was with her daughter, Christina, and her husband, Frank.

Celly was a member of Knotts Speak Easy since joining in 1993. She soon became an Area Governor, Division C Governor, and then District Secretary. Celly became District Governor in 2006-07 and achieved the first Distinguished District award in five years. She is the only District Governor in which all eight of her Division Governors achieved President Distinguished status.

In 2013 Celly had a bilateral mastectomy afterwhich she went through six months of Chemo and radiation treatment. She was cancer free up to just over a year ago when the cancer returned in the bones and the liver. After additional Chemo treatment, it seemed that the liver cancer had vanished, though the bone cancer remained.

Throughout all this time, she was working for AT&T until about a month ago, when she took a medical leave. Then within 3 to 4 days into her leave, her liver began to shutdown causing fluids to stay in her body. She was still quite

functional, but much slower and sluggish than usual, and the fluid buildup was quite extensive. She looked like she was 10 months pregnant—with triplets. Finally after urging urging from her husband and daughter, she went to the ER.

She was sluggish, but relatively coherent and conversive. With the help of dear church friends from church, she arranged her own funeral arrangements. However, the toxins from the fluids began to affect her other organs.

She was taken to ICU with extremely low blood pressure. Througout her last day, she was unresponsive, though she had several relatives and classmates visit her.

Then she passed comfortably and peacefully a bit before 3:30 am, June 7, 2017. Though cancer can be a painful and drawn out part of love, Celly was uncomfortable, but never in pain—at least not until the last few short hours.

Celly's ashes will be interred at the Christ Cathedral on Saturday, July 8, 2017 for anyone who might want to attend.
